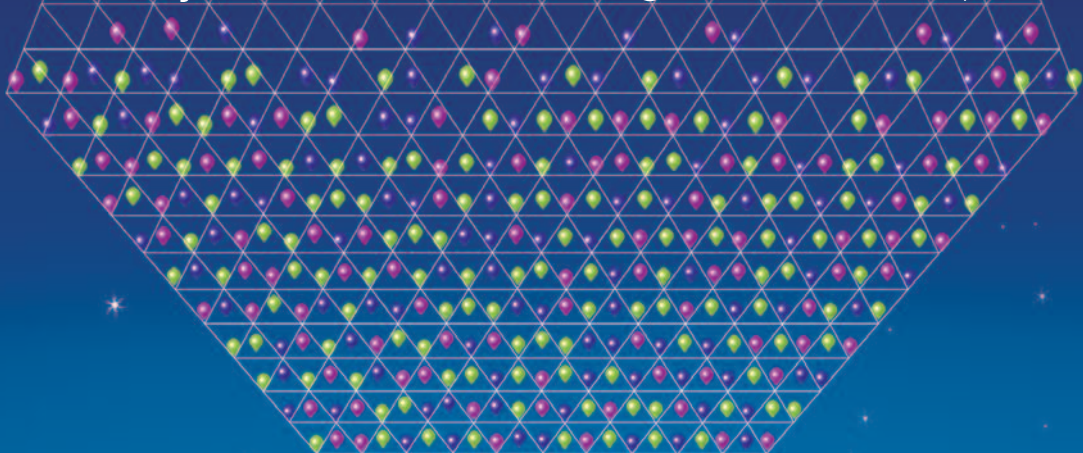

During the lunar eclipse on 4 May you will have the opportunity to experience a unique event.

Hovering above the 17th century Queen's House, Sky Ear is a cloud of helium-filled balloons from which are suspended mobile phones, LEDs and electromagnetic sensors that emit different coloured lights when activated. On the evening, viewers in the grounds and people on the web will be able to dial up the cloud using freephone numbers and manipulate the patterns of illumination.

Come along early, bring a picnic and enjoy being a part of contemporary art in the making.
